EC – OR Tambo District Buffalo City Nelson Mandela Bay	<p>HPPSA has been working in Eastern Cape Province since 2008. Several development projects successfully implemented by HPPSA in Eastern Cape Province are listed below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – From 2008 to 2011, HPPSA received funding from Global Fund (through the National Department of Health and the Amathole District Municipality) to employ 200 CHWs to implement a TCE program entitled Expanding Services & Strengthening Systems for the implementation of activities as part of the comprehensive plan for HIV/AIDS in South Africa in Amathole District (Great Kei, Mquma, and Mbashe); – From 2011-2015, HPPSA established the Child Aid Elliotdale project with support from the National Development Agency in Mbashe Local Municipality. The program reached 3,000 families with HIV services and provided capacity building to local organisations; – From 2012 and 2016, HPPSA partnered with Mondelez and UNDP to run a Farmers Club program reaching 400 farmers; – From 2015 and 2018, HPPSA partnered with the Foundation for Professional Development with funding from USAID to run the TCE program in Buffalo City and Nelson Mandela Bay. The program employed 200 CHWs who provided home based HIV testing services; – From 2016 to 2020, HPPSA partnered with the Foundation for Professional Development with funding from KfW and the National Department of Health to run the TCE HIV project in Nelson Mandela Bay (OR Tambo and Chris Hani Districts); – Currently, HPPSA runs Child Aid Mthatha with funding from the National Department of Social Development and has just secured funding for a HOPE HIV project from the National Department of Health. GP - City of Johannesburg, City of Tswane, Sedibeng	<p>HPPSA has been working in Gauteng Province since 1995. Several development projects successfully implemented by HPPSA in Gauteng Province are listed below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – From 1995 until now, HPPSA has partnered with the Gauteng Department of Health and Gauteng Department of Social Development to implement HIV/AIDS projects that include skills development and social programs targeting women and youth. The projects continue to operate with the support from the Department of Health and corporate partners. Though the interventions are based in Region C, HPPSA’s Child Aid Doornkop project has provided services in both Regions A and D. – In 2003, HPPSA partnered with the Gauteng Department of Health, British American Tobacco, Eskom Foundation, Johnson and Johnson and Aspen Phamacare to employ some 100 Community Health Workers (CHWs) to implement the TCE program in Braamfischerville. The TCE program was expanded to Tshepisoong in 2005 to 2007 where 50 CHW were employed. 	GP Health GP Social Development BAT Eskom J & J Aspen GF EU

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - From 2008 to 2012, HPPSA received Global Fund funding through the National Department of Health to employ 200 CHWs to implement a TCE program entitled Expanding Services & Strengthening Systems for the implementation of the comprehensive plan for HIV and AIDS in South Africa in West Rand covering Kagiso, Munseville, Simunye and Western area. - In 2010, HPPSA partnered with the Gauteng Department of Youth, Sport and Culture and the European Union to empower 60 youth on an HIV prevention intervention. - With funding from FHI 360, HPPSA implemented the Supportive Referral Initiative (SRI) for OVC Programs (DREAMS) in three of the Gauteng Provinces districts of City of Johannesburg, City of Tshwane and Sedibeng from April 2016 to April 2018. The goal of the project was to increase acceptance and access to sensitized HCT in the selected PEPFAR scale-up districts. The modalities used were systematic Home Based Testing and Mobile Testing to test 271,756 people. Systematic Home-Based Testing was the modality through which the highest number of AGYW and MSOs were tested (93%) followed by home mobile testing (7%). - Currently HPPSA is implementing two programs in the City of Johannesburg (Child Aid Doornkop and HOPE Johannesburg Metro Health District) covering Regions C/D of COJ. 	
<p>KZN eThekweni Zululand uThukela Amajuba</p>	<p>HPPSA has been working in KwaZulu-Natal Province since 2003. Several development projects successfully implemented by HPPSA in KwaZulu-Natal Province are listed below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The National Headquarters for HPPSA are in Pinetown. The first program in KwaZulu Natal was a HOPE Durban program implemented between 2003 and 2005 covering sections of eThekweni and iLembe Districts. From 2008 to 2012 HPPSA received Global Fund funding through the National Department of Health to implement a TCE program entitled Expanding Services & Strengthening Systems for the implementation of the comprehensive plan for HIV and in AIDS in South Africa in iLembe District. Between 2016 and 2018, HPPSA partnered with FHI360 to implement the DREAMS programs with funding from USAID in eThekweni and uMkhanyakude. HPPSA runs four long terms programs in KwaZulu Natal, including HOPE uPhongolo, Child Aid Abaqulusi and Preschools of the Future in iLembe and Manganeni in eThekweni. For the period 2017 until now, HPPSA has partnered with the National Department of Health, Elimination 8 and Lebombo Spatial Development to establish a malaria elimination program that covers Zululand District. - With funding from FHI 360, HPPSA implemented the Supportive Referral Initiative (SRI) for OVC Programs (DREAMS) in two KwaZulu Natal districts of eThekweni and uMkhanyakude, uThukela and Amajuba from April 2016 to April 2018. project was to increase acceptance and access to sensitized HCT in the selected PEPFAR scale-up districts. The modalities used were systematic Home Based Testing and Mobile Testing to test 271,756 people. Systematic Home-Based Testing was the modality through which the highest number of AGYW and MSOs were tested (93%) followed by home mobile testing (7%).

- Total Control of the Epidemic (TCE) – Youth Friendly – KZN was funded by DOH KZN and USAID. The program started in May 2012 with funding from USAID. In October 2012 an agreement was signed with KZN DOH to extend the programme until April 2015. This programme was implemented in four sub-districts of Zululand with a target of 400,000 people. The services provided to the communities included HIV testing, TB Screening, condom distribution, Home Based Care and referrals for various services including social grants. The programme was implemented under the government’s Youth Friendly Services program, meaning it had a special focus on youth. The program reached out to the majority of the 400,000 people. A good working relationship was established with the wards and also with the public health facilities. HPPSA participated in monthly District meetings and worked together with Sukuma Sakhe program under the Premier’s Office.
- Between 2011-2012, HPPSA received funding from the Discovery Trust Fund to implement an HIV intervention program in iLembe and eThekweni districts. The objective of the program was to identify pregnant women during the TCE door-to-door campaign, mobilize them for early bookings at the clinics and get them enrolled in the PMTCT program. Afterwards, the program followed the pregnant mothers to ensure that those who tested positive received and adhered to ART during pregnancy. The project also followed the mother and baby for 6 weeks after birth to support the HIV positive mothers in avoiding infecting that their babies. As a result, 201 out of the 869 pregnant women tested for HIV tested HIV positive and all took a CD4 count. 69 mothers started ART and were assisted in forming TRIO ART support groups with family members. All babies were born HIV free. After 6 weeks, 3 babies tested HIV positive and started ART. The program provided support to 179 pregnant women who had defaulted from the PMTCT program and needed to get back on track. FOs gave health talks in clinics about PMTCT throughout the program to mobilize women to join the program and book at an early stage.
- Currently HPPSA is implementing a Preschools of the Future Program, a TCE Sex Work Program, an elimination of malaria program and HOPE HTS program.
